

Enquiries were also made from L. M and S. Railway concerning the discharge of water from Ruyard Lake and the information was to the effect that such discharge was a compensation water and remained constant. They also said that the River Dane was practically dried up.

From these findings it appears ^{to be imperative} that Electricity Power be taken to Crumpwood as soon as possible.

As a result of the resumption of work at Leekbrook and Cheddleton, the flow of water in the Churnethas definitely improved.

During the past week the Crude Oil Engine has been run whenever there was insufficient water to drive the Turbines, both day and night.
